Types of FHQ Structure




Military Observer Mission

Multidimensional Mission (>10,000 military)


Military Observer Mission Structure






Small/Medium Size Mission Structure

Force/Sector Chief of Staff - Responsibilities



- Coordinates/directs staff activities
- Coordinates with higher and adjacent HQ staff
- Supports Force/Sector Commander in Decision Making

 Understands Comd's intent and subordinate units' capabilities and limitations

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Military Staff Officers



- Assist in exercising control
- Organised into branches by function and each branch has its own responsibilities
- Under COS supervision in Force/Sector HQ
- No command authority

UN Staff Branches



- U1 Personnel and Administration
- U2 Military Peacekeeping-Intelligence
- U3 Operations
- U4 Logistics
- U5 Current Plans and Policy
- U6 Communications
- U7 Military Training
- U8 Military Engineering
- U9 UN Civil-Military-Coordination

- ☐ **FHQs** use "**U**" (U1, U2, U3, etc.)
- □ **Sectors** use "**G**" (G1, G2, G3, etc.)
- ☐ Units use "S" (\$1, \$2, \$3, etc.)

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U1 - Responsibilities



- Monitor unit strength status
- Manage personnel replacement
- Arrange honours and awards/medals
- Ensure casualty reporting through Chain of Command
- Prepare performance evaluation
- Operate postal operations
- Implement Screening and Human Rights Due Diligence Policy

U2 - Responsibilities



- Provide UN Military PK-I required for planning and operations
- Produce timely, relevant, concise, and predictive PK-I products to support decision-making
- Prepare the Intelligence Collection Plan
- Give early warning of all threats to mandate implementation
- Conduct a full Analysis of the Operational Environment (AOE)

U3 - Responsibilities



- Prepare, coordinate, and distribute FRAGOs and WARNORDs
- Recommend task organisation and missions to subordinate elements
- Plan troop movements
- Establish a 24/7 Military Operations Centre
- Coordinate POC activities with Police Component

U4 - Responsibilities



- Support planning and conduct of operations across logistics functions:
 - Supply
 - Maintenance
 - Transport/Movements
- Coordinate logistics issues with Mission Support Division

U5 - Responsibilities



- Perform long-term planning
- Develop OPORDs, OPLANs and CONPLANs
- Coordinate strategic and operational planning
- Develop, coordinate, and implement FHQ policy issues
- Advise the HOMC/FC on political-military aspects of operations

Coordinate with Civilian and Police Components

U6 - Responsibilities



 Prepare, maintain and update command, control, communications, and computer operations, operation estimates, plans, and orders

Manage Electromagnetic Spectrum (Frequencies, Bands, etc.)

 Coordinate, plan and direct communications operations vulnerability and risk assessments

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U7 - Responsibilities



- Conduct Induction and in-mission training
- Implement and monitor Force annual training programme
- Plan, coordinate, and supervise troop exercises

Identify training requirements, based on Mandate and situation

Plan, coordinate, and conduct periodic training for selected officers

U8 - Responsibilities



- Develop Force Engineer support plans and programmes
- Advise on military engineering capabilities and employment
- Plan, coordinate, implement and monitor counter-IED, de-mining and EOD tasks under military domain
- Coordinate humanitarian and non-military activities assigned to military engineers

U9 - Responsibilities




- Coordinate the military UN-CIMIC operations with other UN agencies
- Provide guidance to TCC units in identifying, planning, and implementing programs to support the civilian populations
- Coordinate with humanitarian civil assistance and disaster relief through established UN-CMCoord mechanism

Act as the FHQ's focal point for Quick Impact Projects

Supporting Staff and Branches



- Military Assistants to the FC, DFC and FCOS
- Advisory Group:
 - Force Legal Advisor
 - Force Medical Officer
 - Force Provost Marshall
 - Chief General Advisor
 - Military Gender Advisor
 - Military Liaison Cell
 - Protocol Officer, etc



Summary of Key Messages



 Multidimensional integrated missions are structured to ensure optimum command, control and coordination between all actors

- Missions are configured as per their relative strength and complexity
- All staff officers need to understand their own roles and responsibilities and be aware of those of other departments to ensure proper coordination
