Module 7



Dos and Don'ts for the United Nations Police

Module at a Glance

Overview

This module aims to summarize the material covered in the first six modules of the training course by focusing on best practices to be applied by United Nations Police officers when working with children.

Learning Objectives

At the end of the module, learners will be able to:

- Recall key messages from each module
- Correctly apply the key messages in their capacity-building role in support of the host-State police

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The Module

When this module, instructors will help United Nations Police (UNPOL) personnel recall the key messages from the six modules of the training course and prepare for their monitoring, mentoring and advisory role in the mission. Learners will be reminded of the positive behaviours expected of UNPOL officers with regard to child protection. Learning Activity 7.1 takes the form of a series of "dos and don'ts" in line with the content presented in modules 1 to 6.

NOTE to instructors: there are different ways to facilitate this module. The key variables that will influence your facilitation strategy include the amount of time available, the modules covered, the size of the group, and the dynamics among participants. Possible strategies to consider when preparing the module include:

- Coverage of modules 1 to 6: instructors are encouraged to cover all the dos and don'ts in this module, even if only parts of modules 1 to 6 may have been covered. Learning Activity 7.1 serves as both a reminder of the content covered, as well as a refresher for content not covered in this course, but with which participants should nevertheless be familiar.
- Division of labour: instructors should ensure that all participants have the opportunity to review all the dos and don'ts statements covering the entire course, in their group work. This would ensure greater assimilation of learning objectives. It is therefore suggested to allow all the groups to review the 60 statements and to determine, as a group, first of all, whether each statement is a "do" or a "don't". Nonetheless, if time is limited, instructors may want to ask each group to focus only on the dos and don'ts statements of one module. During the debriefing, participants will have the opportunity to listen to all the statements.
- Support material: as mentioned in the introduction, this module can be facilitated without handouts and a PowerPoint presentation, by asking participants to review the statements from their device, and/or the instructor may read the statements out loud and ask the participants to vote for "do" or "don't" each time.
- Expanding the list of statements: instructors are encouraged to add statements to those already listed when relevant so as to reflect particular learning objectives that generated more discussion when facilitating the modules. This will reinforce the importance of those takeaways.
- Methodology: This module can be facilitated in different creative ways: e.g., voting by show of hands or feet or other, using cards, or plenary discussions, etc.

Learning Activity 7.1

Dos and Don'ts for the United Nations Police

TIME: 100 minutes

- Introduction of activity and instructions: 5 minutes
- Group work: 35 minutes
- Plenary: 60 minutes

Slide 4: Learning Activity 7.1 – Instructions



INSTRUCTIONS:

- Divide the participants into six groups.
- Distribute the list of 60 statements to all the groups.
- Ask each group to check "dos" and "don'ts" in relation to each of the 60 statements. Give the groups 35 minutes to complete the exercise (i.e., about 6 minutes per module, each module is associated with 10 statements).
- In the plenary, ask group 1 to present the 10 statements of module 1. Someone in group 1 should read the first statement out loud and indicate whether it is a "do" or a "don't". Then, ask the other five groups to indicate:



thumbs up, if they think that is the right answer, or



thumbs down if they don't.

Use the sheet with the correct answers to facilitate the discussion, if necessary.

- Then ask someone else in group 1 read the second statement out loud and proceed in the same way until all 10 statements from module 1 have been presented.
- Once group 1 has covered the 10 statements in module 1, move onto group 2 for module 2 statements and apply the same method until all 60 statements for the six modules have been covered by the six groups.
