What is DDR



- Reintegrating following a conflict
- Ex-combatants, armed groups, abductees, dependents, civilian returnees, communities
- Political, military, security, humanitarian, socio-economic dimensional process



Three Components of DDR

- Demobilization
- Disarmament
- Reintegration

Rehabilitation

Reconciliation

Resettlement

Reinsertion



Disarmament

- Collection of Weapons
- Documentation
- Control and Disposal





How is Disarmament Done

- Targeted groups
- Foreign irregulars
- Disarmament of police
- Mine clearance
- Disarmament by neutral party
- Collection of weapons
- Light weapons









Demobilization

Formal and controlled discharge of active combatants from armed forces or other armed groups





Demobilization

Education



Job counseling and referral



Sports, recreation, entertainment



Vocational skills /agricultural training





Reinsertion

Assistance offered to ex-combatants during demobilization prior to the longer-term process of reintegration





Reintegration

The process by which ex-combatants acquire civilian status and gain employment and income






